This Week's Parashah

God instructs Moses to count all males from thirty to fifty years of age who belong to the Gershonite and Merarite clans of the Levites, and to give each of these families specific duties connected assembling. disassembling. and transporting the Tabernacle. The Torah portion then turns to the subject of impurity and circumstances that cause one's removal (for a time) from the of Israel. After congregation discussing the financial consequences of wronging another person, the Torah addresses the issue of adultery. The Torah portion continues with the rules for becoming a "Nazir." By taking a vow of abstinence, the Nazirite was prohibited from drinking wine or alcohol, from cutting his or her hair. and from coming into contact with the dead. At the end of their vow period, Nazirites were to bring a special offering to the Tent of Meeting, which the priest would offer as a sacrifice. God tells Moses to teach Aaron a special three-fold blessing to use when blessing the people of Israel: "May the Lord bless you and protect you. May the Lord illuminate His countenance for you and be gracious to you. May the Lord lift His countenance to you and establish peace for you." These familiar words remain a part of our liturgy and form part of the blessing, traditionally bestowed by parents upon their children each Friday night and by our clergy upon our B'nai Mitzvah.

Today's Haftarah

The Haftarah comes from the Book of Judges. This selection details the beginning of Samson's life. A barren woman is visited by an Angel of God. The angel tells her that she will soon give birth to a boy who will help save the Jewish people from the Philistines. The woman is not to drink any alcoholic beverages or to eat any unclean food because her son, Samson, is going to be a Nazirite. Usually, one took the Nazarite vow upon oneself, however, Samson is destined to be a life-long Nazirite because of God's special plan for him. After Samson is born, he is prohibited from cutting his hair, consuming alcohol, or having contact with the dead, as this week's Torah portion directs. The connection between this week's Torah reading and Haftarah is a fairly clear one. The Torah portion provides the set of rules by which Nazirites were to have abided. The Haftarah tells the story of one of the most well-known Nazirites in our tradition: Samson.
