This Week's Parashah

Moses tells the people how he pleaded with God to let him enter the land of Israel. Moses is only denied entry into the Land, he suggests, on account of the Israelites. Moses urges the Jewish people to follow the Torah's commandments. statutes. and ordinances precisely - and not to add to or diminish from them. He emphasizes that the people are to teach the laws to their children because God's covenant with the Jewish people is binding on future generations. He then describes the punishments that would befall them if they forget God or make graven images. They will perish from the land, be dispersed among the nations and become few in number. But God will show mercy to those who repent. This Torah portion is notable for containing two major components of the covenant—and indeed, the foundation of the Torah: the Ten Commandments and the Sh'ma. The parsha ends with Moses the people warning against intermarrying with the nations that they will encounter upon entering the Promised Land.

Today's Haftarah

"Comfort, oh comfort, my people." The name of this week's Haftarah, Nachamu, comes from the first words of the text. In this Haftarah, Isaiah assures the Judeans, who have now been in exile for nearly 50 years, that God has forgiven them for past wrongs, and expanding upon the themes in the Torah portion, assures Israel that if they remain loyal to God, they will be gathered into God's arms like a shepherd "gathers lambs in his arms and carries them in his bosom."

This is the first of seven "Haftarot of Consolation" that follow Tisha B'Av and lead into Rosh Hashanah. These Haftarot offer messages of comfort and encouragement that have sustained the Jewish people during centuries of persecution.
