This Week's Parashah

Moses continues his review of the 40 years spent in the wilderness. He tells the people that if they obey God's rules, God will maintain the covenant and they will prosper. God will continue to intervene on their behalf in the face of their enemies. Moses tells the Israelites that their wandering these 40 years has been a test to understand the nature of the Israelites and to ensure that they will maintain God's laws. Moses reminds the people that their food, clothing and all their needs come ultimately from God. They are told "when you have eaten your fill, give thanks to the Lord." This verse is the basis for reciting Birkat ha-Mazon. The Israelites learn that it is not by their virtues that they will enter the Promised Land. for the Israelites have done nothing but provoke and anger God on their journey. They will enter the Land due to the oath God made to their ancestors, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. If the Israelites do all that God commands they will have all they need: rain in its season, harvest when it is time. But if they are swayed by other gods and fail in keeping God's commandments they will suffer. This section (Deut. 11:13-21) forms the second paragraph of the Sh'ma.

Today's Haftarah

Isaiah assures the children of Israel that God has not forgotten them. God punishes Israel for its sins, yet takes Israel back in compassion. In the aftermath, Israel's oppressors will suffer misfortune and they will come to know that there is but one God. "God will comfort Zion," says the prophet, "making her wilderness like Eden." What the people had seen destroyed will once again bloom. This is the second of seven "Haftarot of Consolation" that follow Tisha B'Av and lead into Rosh Hashanah. These Haftarot offer messages of comfort and encouragement that have sustained the Jewish people during centuries of persecution.
