This Week's Parashah

Ki Tetze reviews a variety of laws intended to strengthen family life and human decency:

- A person finding a lost item or an animal is obligated to locate the owner and return the lost property.
- Our animals must be treated fairly and humanely. Animals of different types, such as an ox and a donkey, should not be harnessed to work together. Their differing strengths and sizes could cause them to suffer if paired.
- A mother bird sitting on its nest should be sent away before gathering the eggs or taking the offspring.
- If an escaping slave finds his way to the home of an Israelite, that Israelite is required to provide refuge. The community is responsible for the needs of strangers, widows, and orphans.
- Those in need are permitted by the law to take bundles of grain left in the field, or from the olives and fruit left behind by the owner after the harvest.
- Vows made to God must be fulfilled, and in a timely fashion. Vow making is not encouraged, but taken very seriously.

Today's Haftarah

Isaiah lived in Babylon during the exile. He compares the exiled Children of Israel to a barren woman. Isaiah prophesies that soon many children will be "born to the wife forlorn." He tells them that Israel will soon be restored, and when that happens, the land will be beautiful and fruitful. It will no longer be dry and barren. There will be great love between God and His people and the covenant of Peace shall be restored. God's love for Israel is unshakable: "For the mountains may move, and the hills be shaken, but My loyalty shall never move from you, nor My covenant of friendship be shaken." This is the fifth of the Haftarot of Consolation chanted between Tisha B'av and Rosh Hashanah. These words of this Haftarah are meant to comfort the Judeans during the exile, renewing their confidence as they look to the future.
