- **Repairs**
 - One air condition unit for the Library area was replaced for the cost of \$20K in the month of July. This unit was not under contract anymore and the replacement AC unit was heavily discounted.
 - We have completed a Tuck pointing and cleanup of the outside North wall of the synagogue during the month of July.
- **Parking lot**
 - Remaining work for landscaping of the islands and misc. painting of the light pole bases and other parking lot painting work are all deferred to 2021 when we are open.
 - Congregation Beth Slalom Signs – We have received generous donation of \$10K from sisterhood for replacing CBS signs located in the Walters Avenue and at front entrance of the building. We have also paid and received a survey for the replacement of CBS sign on Walters Avenue. House committee and executive director have decided to postpone this work to 2021, when the synagogue is open.
- **Security Enhancements**
 - Security measures have been reviewed while the synagogue remains closed.
- **Capital Reserve report**
 - The asset life schedule has been updated and shared with Financial Committee for budget use.

- High Holidays
 - High holidays will be streamed via the CBS website to members in good standing
 - Enhance Productions has been contracted to produce, pre-record, and stream the services
 - Youth services (both for children ages birth – 7 and 8 – 13) have been licensed from Rick Recht, Shira Klein, and Rabbi Josh Warshawsky. Services will be available on demand from our website for members in good standing.
 - The Ritual, Professional, and Administrative staff have all been fantastic in their coordination and collaboration.
- B'nei Mitzvahs
 - All scheduled b'nei mitzvah through the end of the calendar year have been contacted and alternative arrangements have been made as the building remains closed. Alternatives have included the use of a Torah on the scheduled day for them to complete a 'Zoom' Mitzvah, rescheduling fully to an alternative date in the future, or scheduling for an Aliyah in the Kamensky sanctuary
 - We welcome Randi Simon, B'nei Mitzvah Coordinator and Tutor. Randi is responsible for the coordination of aliyot for both a b'nei mitzvah and regular Shabbat services along with handling a portion of the tutoring responsibilities.

School Report

School is ready to begin a new year of learning. An important goal of the CBS Religious School is to partner with families to provide a positive, Jewish education and experience. As our families try to plan for the fall, and in order to help, we released a very detailed plan for the Religious School for the upcoming school year. Of course, these plans are subject to change based on the guidance we receive from the State of Illinois, the Health Department and the CDC. We anticipate that we will be moving in and out of phases during the school year and are prepared to do so without interruption to student learning.

Calls are being made to each Religious School family to discuss our plans for teaching, financial concerns, encourage registration, and to invite participation on the School Board. A second round of calls will commence shortly.

Teachers will be at Yom Beth Shalom to meet each and every one of their students “face-to-face” (or we would say “mask-to-mask”) so that our students are most comfortable with the learning experience. At that time, each student will receive a bag of supplies that they will use throughout the year.

We do not anticipate holding online kindergarten as, according to our educators, online learning is not very effective at that age. Instead, there will be age-appropriate projects in the bags distributed, and there may be some smaller, shorter sessions with those youngsters as young as age 4.

It is still early, so we cannot judge how well registration is going. Due to the conversion to Shul Cloud, we do not have the ability to compare the progress of registrations from past years to this time last year. Anecdotally, however we believe we are on track or only very slightly behind years past at this point.

Interest in our *Madrachim* program has been robust, and interviews will begin very shortly. Our high school program continues to grow as well.

Youth Report

Just because many of our congregants might not have gone away to camp or participated in their regular camps this year, we had our own CampCBS this summer lead by our very own Eric Golberg. This was a brand-new programming initiative. During the eight weeks, we featured 45

online and offline programs with over 450 downloads! We were able to engage not only our youth but engage congregants' grandchildren and extended family all over the country! The feedback was great from the young families that participated.

Our Chaverim and Kadima families will have a lot to look forward to this fall as well. We are planning monthly activities for them and will be continuing a lot of what we learned of what worked over the summer and continuing it into the fall.

Our award-winning USY chapter was also hard at work planning next year. With the new board elected they spent the summer planning events and activities. Because of everything going on this year and so much uncertainty, they only planning the first half of the year. At this time, they are planning on doing their weekly lounge nights (virtual) as well as doing alternate Monday programming each week for 8-12th graders featuring freshman facetime and will continue to offer more programming than we would do if we were in person.

After all summer programs were canceled at the beginning of the summer, International USY launched #MyUSYfiSummer, where for \$99 for the entire summer, they offered age-appropriate programming and different drop-in events for different age groups. In addition, if you did not see, International USY announced late last month that they have decided not to hold any in-person overnight programs for the remainder of 2020. This includes programs such as LTI, Fall Conventions, Kadima Conventions, and International Convention in Washington, D.C. Earlier this week they provided additional details similar to #MyUSYfiSummer where for \$199 for the fall they can participate in all regional events and programming until International Convention and if they register at the same time, the International Convention will also be \$199 (virtual this year). We are still trying to figure out how this will work exactly and what this means for CBS and our youth groups, but no matter what we are committed to continuing the strong programming that Eric has been working on since the pandemic started.

Finally, if you don't remember, a couple of years ago JUF started the LEAD Award (Matt Rissien was its first recipient). The LEAD Award (Leader, Educator, Advisor, Dugma/Example) was created to recognize the outstanding adults who go above and beyond in their role of educating and caring for Jewish teens. Nominees were recognized by teens in the community who completed applications sharing how the nominee had influenced them nomination and the selection process was run by the Jewish Teen Alliance of Chicago, a teen board made up of representatives of Jewish teen experiences in the community. Historically the award is given as part of our 18 Under 18 Celebration which unfortunately didn't happen this year. I am pleased to let you know that Eric Golberg was one of the four finalists for this year LEAD Award. In addition, one of our USY Advisors Adam Blue was another one of the four finalists because of his work with Stand With Us. Ultimately, the award this year went to Daniel Warshawsky – CHUSY Assistant Regional Teen Engagement Director. All of this is to confirm what you already know, we have amazing people helping to mentor the future of CBS and the Conservative Movement.
