This Week's Parashah

B'reshit - where it all begins. On the First Day, God creates Day and Night. On the Second Day, God creates The Heavens--dividing the upper and lower waters. The Third Day sees the birth of the earth, seas, plants, trees, and vegetation. On the Fourth Day, God creates the sun, moon, and stars; and on the Fifth - fish, water creatures, and birds. On the Sixth Day, land animals, and Adam and Eve. On the Seventh Day - God rests.

Adam and Eve live in the Garden of Eden and God commands Adam not to eat from the Tree of Knowledge of Good & Evil. However, a serpent in the garden persuades Eve to eat the fruit from this prohibited tree. Eve then gives Adam the fruit to eat. Adam and Eve, and all people who follow, are then punished for disobeying God's one and only commandment.

Adam and Eve have two sons: Cain and Abel. The brothers bring offerings to God. Abel's offering is accepted, but Cain's is not. A jealous Cain kills Abel, and responds to God's inquiry, "Am I my brother's keeper?"

God expresses dismay at the evil humanity has perpetrated, promising to blot out everything created. Noah, however, finds favor with God.

Today's Haftarah

This haftarah is part of a long narrative in the Bible describing David's ultimate ascent to the throne. King Saul was envious of David's fame in battle and urged his courtiers to kill his perceived rival. Ultimately. Saul himself pursues David. David flees to his close friend Jonathan, Saul's own son. David and Jonathan set forth a plan to reveal Saul's true intentions for David. The events in this week's haftarah begin on the eve of the new moon (Rosh Chodesh). This haftarah is always chanted when Rosh Chodesh falls on a Sunday. The Shabbat immediately preceding Rosh Chodesh is called Machar Chodesh, signifying that Rosh Chodesh begins the next day.
