This Week's Parashah

Seventeen years have passed since Jacob and his family settled in Egypt. Jacob realizes that he is about to die and he makes Joseph swear that he will bury him in Canaan, in the burial place of his ancestors, and not in Egypt. Joseph brings his two sons - Manasseh and Ephraim - before Jacob, who gives them the status of sons rather than grandsons. As he prepares to bless them, Jacob places his right hand on the head of Ephraim, the younger brother, and his left hand on the head of Manasseh, the older. Joseph tries to correct his father, but Jacob informs him that the younger one is destined to be greater than his older brother, and the descendants of Ephraim will be numerous. Jacob then summons all of his sons. In what is usually referred to as a final blessing, he describes the character, and depicts the future, of each one. After Jacob's burial at Machpelah, Joseph observes a seven-day mourning period. When they return to Egypt, Joseph's brothers fear that now, at last, Joseph will take revenge upon them, but Joseph tells them they have no cause for concern. As the portion (and the book of Genesis) closes, Joseph is about to die, and he makes his brothers swear that he, too, will be buried in Canaan.

Today's Haftarah

In this Haftarah from the Book of Kings, King David - like Jacob in the Torah portion - is on his deathbed. As Jacob used the occasion to speak to his sons, David gives instruction to his son Solomon, who will inherit the throne. Solomon is instructed to eliminate two of David's enemies, and to treat kindly the family that provided aid to David and his troops. Most importantly, David tells him to uphold his faith in God, walk in God's ways, and carry out the laws, commandments, and rules of justice found in the Torah. Both the Torah reading and Haftarah address the approaching death of a leader. In the Torah portion, Jacob; in the Haftarah, David. Each also addresses the final words of guidance and blessing to their respective sons.
