This Week's Parashah

Pharaoh's courtiers plead with him to obey God in order to stop the plagues and save Egypt. When Pharaoh ignores their advice, locusts, the 8th plague, come to destroy those parts of Egypt left unharmed by hail (7th plague). The plague ends when Pharaoh pleads with Moses and Aaron, but God, again, hardens Pharaoh's heart. The plague of darkness falls without warning - only the Israelites have light where they live. God tells Moses that the next plague, the slaving of the first-born, will be the last. Moses and Aaron instruct the Israelites in the laws of Passover. On the 10th day of the first month, they are to slaughter a lamb, smear its blood on their doorposts, and eat its roasted flesh hurriedly in remembrance of the 10th plague and their hasty Exodus from Egypt. For seven days, they are to eat only unleavened bread. The Israelites apply lamb's blood to their doorposts as instructed. In the middle of the night, all the firstborn Egyptian males are struck down. Pharaoh summons Moses and Aaron and bids them to depart with the Israelites. Because of their haste in leaving Egypt, the people take their dough with them before it rises. Exodus 13:8 says that "you shall tell your son the story of the exodus from Egypt." The rabbis derived from this verse that parents are obligated to relate the story to their children on the eve of Passover. The story, found in the Haggadah, is told during the course of the Seder by Jewish families worldwide. It is important to tell the story of the Exodus in a way that is understandable and accessible to the next generation. A variety of creative and engaging Haggadot have been published recently that help families fulfill this important obligation.

Today's Haftarah

Jeremiah had warned the people of Judea against alliances with Egypt. His warnings prove to be necessary when Egypt surrenders to Babylon, paving the way for the conquest of the Southern Kingdom of Israel and the exile of the Judeans. Jeremiah, who was jailed for his preaching, tells the Jewish people not to be afraid because God is with them, even in exile, and will one day return them to their homeland. The Haftarah this week, presents a counterpoint to the Israelites' plight in Egypt. Jeremiah's prophecy of Egypt's destruction references the 8th plaque. The numerous armies that will come upon Egypt "are more numerous than locusts and cannot be counted."
