This Week's Parashah

God tells Moses to instruct Aaron **not** to come freely into the Holy of Holies. Only once a year, on the tenth day of the seventh month (*Yom Kippur*), may he, as the High Priest (*Kohen Gadol*), enter. This is the day of atonement for all the sins of the Israelites. The Kohen Gadol takes two male goats, designating one for God and one for Azazel. He slaughters the goat marked for God as a sin offering, using its blood to cleanse the people's sins from the *Ohel Moed* (the Tent of Meeting), the altar, and the Holy of Holies. The Kohen Gadol then confesses the sins of the Israelites over the goat for Azazel and this goat is set free in the wilderness. The Tent of Meeting is declared to be the only place fit for offering sacrifices to God. The people are reminded not to consume blood, for blood represents life itself, and not to eat of an animal that has died or been torn by wild beasts. God instructs Moses to tell the Israelites: "*Kedoshim ti'hiyu*" (you shall be holy), and then provides a series of laws and regulations which, if followed, will ensure that the Children of Israel are a holy people. These laws include showing reverence for parents, refraining from idolatry as well as a sophisticated outline for ethical behavior, including addressing the needs of the poor, and dealing honestly and fairly with people. The Children of Israel will be permitted to live in the land of Israel as long as they live according to these commandments.

Today's Haftarah

The concluding verses of the Book of Amos form the Haftarah for this Shabbat. Amos lived during the eighth century B.C.E. and his sharp words were directed against the leadership of the Northern Kingdom of Israel. He condemned their irreligious and immoral practices. Amos' major themes were social justice and God's care for all human beings. In this Haftarah, the prophet speaks of impending doom and destruction in store for the Israelites, a consequence of their wanton behavior. But God, in pure love for the people of Israel, also promises through Amos to rebuild the devastated nation and reestablish a time of harmony and peace. This Haftarah provides a forewarning against abandoning the Jewish ideals of social justice and care in our relationships with other people. These themes echo this week's Torah reading with its emphasis on being holy through our actions and interactions with others.
