This Week's Parashah

The Torah portion begins with the laws regulating the lives of the Kohanim (priests), who presided over the sanctuary and its sacrifices. It then describes the holy days in the Jewish calendar, including Shabbat, Pesach, Shavuot, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Shemini Atzeret. Work is prohibited on all of these festivals, and special observances are prescribed for each one. Emor concludes with rules regarding capital punishment and restitution. These laws include showing reverence for parents, and refraining from both idolatry and desecrating the sacrificial system. The laws also include an outline for ethical behavior, including addressing the needs of the poor and dealing honestly and fairly with people. The Children of Israel will be permitted to live in the land of Israel as long as they live according to these commandments.

Today's Haftarah

This week's Haftarah describes the role of the Kohanim in the Holv Temple of Jerusalem. The Haftarah expresses the Prophet Ezekiel's assurance that the Jewish people, then living in Babylonian exile, will return to Jerusalem, and that worship in a rebuilt Temple will once again take place, under the guidance of the Kohanim. Only those Kohanim who served the Lord faithfully prior to the exile - when the People of Israel strayed from God - will be permitted to approach the Lord in the new sanctuary. Both the Haftarah and this week's Torah portion provide details about the rules governing the Kohanim. For example, the Torah tells us that a Kohen may not come into contact with the dead, with the exception of immediate family. The Haftarah. reiterating this prohibition, provides a ritual for purification if circumstances necessitate such contact.
