This Week’s Parashah

This week’s parasha briefly states the rules regarding vows. Jewish tradition considers vows to be serious commitments and these verses are the core of an entire tractate of Talmud called Nedarim (vows). The Israelites are commanded to take revenge upon the Midianites. The Midianite people pose a cultural, not a military, threat to the Israelites. Their attack upon the Israelites has been through temptation and idolatry. The tribes of Reuben and Gad ask to settle east of the Jordan. Moses permits this, provided that they join the rest of the Israelites in the battles to be waged west of the Jordan. At Moab, God tells Moses to instruct the Israelites about settling the land across the Jordan. The Israelites are to assign, out of their holdings, towns and pasture lands to the Levites (who, of all the tribes, do not own land.) Six cities of refuge are to be established. A person who *unintentionally* kills another may flee to one of these six cities. The descendants of Menasheh raise an issue concerning the case of the daughters of Zelophehad (discussed in last week’s sedra). If the daughters marry persons from another tribe, the tribal leaders are concerned that their land holdings will be added to those of the tribe into which they marry, thus diminishing the size of the lands of Menasheh. Moses rules that the daughters of Zelophehad must marry within their father’s tribe. This is based on the general statement that no tribe’s inheritance may pass to another tribe.

Today’s Haftarah

Jeremiah warns the Judeans of difficult times ahead. He pleads with the people to forsake idol worship and return to the worship of one God. He warns that idols are futile in times of trouble, and that God will punish Israel for its unfaithfulness.

This Haftarah is the second of three that are traditionally read during the three weeks leading up to Tisha B’Av, which commemorates the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. Appropriately, this morning’s Haftarah comes from the Book of Jeremiah, the prophet who witnessed the destruction of the First Temple at the hands of the Babylonians in 586 B.C.E. It is believed that the Book of Lamentations which describes the ravaged city of Jerusalem, and is read on Tisha B’Av - was penned by Jeremiah.
