This Week's Parashah

Twelve spies are sent to scout the land of Canaan. Upon their return, ten of the spies report that the land cannot be conquered because it is inhabited by giants. Only Caleb and Joshua believe that God will enable the Israelites to prevail. The masses are swaved by the report of the 10, and they cry out to God, "Is it not better for us to return to Egypt?" God tells Moses that He is prepared to destroy the entire people and start over again with Moses because the Israelites continue to lack faith. Moses tells God that if He destroys the Israelites now, other nations will say that the God of the Jews was not strong enough to bring the people to the Promised Land. The people are spared, but, due to their lack of faith in God, this generation will never enter the Land of Canaan. Of this generation, only Caleb and Joshua will be allowed to enter. Hearing this, the Israelites attempt to enter the land on their own. Without God's help, they are defeated by the people of Canaan. The parsha goes on to detail the sacrifices to be offered once in the Promised Land. In the wilderness, one of the Israelites is found gathering wood on Shabbat, a violation of the Holy day. The man is brought before the whole community and stoned to death as required by Biblical law. Finally, God tells Moses to instruct the Israelites to tie fringes on the corners of their garments as a reminder of God and the commandments. The concluding paragraph of this parsha is recited as the final paragraph of the Sh'ma in our liturgy.

Today's Haftarah

Joshua, who became the leader of the Jewish people after Moses' death, sends two spies to the walled city of Jericho to assess its strengths and weaknesses before attempting to conquer it. The scouts are hidden by a woman named Rahab. When the King's soldiers question Rahab, she saves the lives of the spies by claiming that the men of Israel had come to her, but that they had already escaped the city. In return. Rahab asks that she and her family be saved when the Israelites come to vanguish her city. The spies vow that if she will hang a scarlet thread from her window and have all of her family members in her home, then they will all be spared. Upon returning to the Israelite encampment, the spies assure Joshua that the Israelites will come out victorious.
