This Week's Parashah

Moses tells the people that he has set before them a blessing and a curse - a blessing if they obey God's commandments and a curse if they choose disobedience. Moses outlines the commandments to be observed in the Promised Land. The Israelites must destroy the worship sites of foreign gods, then establish a permanent and central worship site. They may slaughter and consume meat in their settlements, but they are not to eat of the tithes set aside for the sacrifice. Moses admonishes the people to be wary of false prophets who might try and lure them into worshipping other gods. The penalty for this behavior is death. Moses reiterates the laws of *kashrut* to the people, enumerating the animals that may and may not be eaten. Moses instructs the people to put aside a tenth of what they harvest and from the firstborn of their herds and flocks as tithes. These are to be consumed at the central sanctuary. A portion of the tithes brought by the Israelites is to be used to support the Levites, the orphaned and the widowed. Every seventh year is to be observed as a Sabbatical Year by relinquishing all debts and releasing Hebrew servants. The portion closes with Moses detailing the observance of the three pilgrimage festivals: Feast of Unleavened Bread, Feast of Weeks, and Feast of Booths.

Today's Haftarah

The prophet Isaiah speaks to his fellow Jews, who have been exiled after the Babylonians conquered Israel. Many of the Jews have lost hope that they will ever again see the Promised Land. But Isaiah uses marvelous imagery as he depicts the restoration of Israel to its home: "I will build your towers with rubies, your gates with precious stones, your border with gems." Do not lose hope, counsels the prophet. God will make "an everlasting covenant with you," as He showed love and compassion to His servant David. This is the third of seven "Haftarot of Consolation" that follow Tisha B'av and lead into Rosh Hashanah.

Thought to Ponder:

"Where is the self-help section", George Carlin once asked the bookstore salesman. He responded, "I can't tell you, that would defeat the purpose".

This Parsha helps us not only to find God but also to find ourselves. The ability to see (Re'eh) goes beyond the physical blessing of sight to seeing within our spiritual selves as well, a task quite daunting but rewarding.
