This Week's Parashah

Every seventh year is to be a "Shabbat for the Lord," a year of complete rest for the land. The Israelites will not be permitted to work their fields, but they will be allowed to gather and to share whatever the land produces. God assures the people that in the year before the Sabbatical year, there will be sufficient food to tide them over during this time period. A Jubilee Year will occur every fiftieth year. Announced with a blast of the shofar on Yom Kippur, it is a year of release for the land and all its inhabitants. During the Jubilee Year, the land is not to be sown or reaped - it is to lie fallow. However, the people may eat whatever the land produces on its own. All property reverts to its original owner. The Torah cautions the Israelites to be fair when selling property, and to charge only for the use of the land until the advent of the fiftieth year. The law was intended to reinforce among the people the understanding that no one on earth really owns the land. It is all God's possession, and human beings are residents for but a short time. In the Jubilee Year, all Hebrew servants had to be freed. The parsha concludes with a reminder to the people not to set up or worship idols, but to keep God's Sabbaths.

Today's Haftarah

As the parshah recounts the responsibility of the Israelites to redeem the land of their relatives, the Haftarah tells of such an episode in the life of Jeremiah. At a time during the 6th century B.C.E., when it appeared that the Babylonians were sure to destroy Jerusalem and conquer what was left of the kingdom of Israel, Jeremiah is approached by his cousin Hanamel, who requests that the prophet buy his land in Anatot, just outside of Jerusalem. Jeremiah knew that Israel would soon be destroyed, he had already prophesied that end. But he also knew that someday the Jewish people would return to Israel and rebuild it. The purchase of his cousin's land, which he in fact agrees to, is an investment in the future of his people. Jeremiah's acting to redeem land by purchasing that of his cousin links to the Torah portion theme of the Jubilee when all land is to be returned to its original owners so a new beginning can be made.
