This Week's Parashah

As the Israelites are ready to enter the Promised Land, Moses begins to recount the events of the journey. Moses tells of the difficulties in governing the Israelites as they journeyed from Egypt. Judges were appointed to rule over disputes. Moses presents three rules for making fair judgments: "You shall not show partiality...Hear out the small and great alike...Do not be influenced by anyone, for the judgment belongs to God." Moses continues recounting the journey and the Israelites' behavior as they approached Canaan. He retells the story of the spies that were sent ahead. The people had lost faith upon hearing the details of the spies' report of giants and a seemingly unbeatable enemy. It was this event that prevented that generation from ever entering Promised Land. Of that generation, only Caleb, who had given an encouraging report of the Land, and Joshua, who was to be the next leader, will live to enter Canaan. The portion closes with Moses naming Joshua as his successor.

Today's Haftarah

Isaiah warns Jews for all the generations of the moral transgressions that can lead to the downfall of the Jewish people. God does not want nor need empty ritual if the people fail to lead ethical lives. "Learn to do well. Search for justice, aid the oppressed, be true to the orphan, plead for the widow," says Isaiah. "What use to me are all of your sacrifices?" This haftarah is always chanted on the Shabbat just before the fast day of Tisha B'av and is the final of three haftarot in a series leading up to Tisha B'av that rebukes Israel for its sinfulness. But the prophet Isaiah offers the possibility that if Israel returns to God in sincere repentance, there can still be redemption. Following Tisha B'av, the haftarot form another series, this time leading up to Rosh Hashanah. These are called the haftarot of Consolation, each offering the message that despite their disloyalty, God offers reward and compassion in exchange for repentance.
