This Week's Parashah

God tells Avram to leave his homeland for an unknown destination, then directs Avram, his wife Sarai and his nephew Lot to the Land of Canaan. When they arrive in Canaan, the travelers find the land in the grips of famine, forcing them to leave for Egypt, where there is food. Before arriving there. Avram instructs Sarai to pretend that she is his sister, a ruse intended to save Avram's life should the Egyptians desire her for Pharaoh's harem. Sarai resides in Pharaoh's house, and Avram, whom Pharaoh believes to be her brother, is treated very well. God intervenes by plaguing Pharaoh's household, and the deception is revealed. Consequently, Avram and Sarai are forced to leave Egypt. On the way back to Canaan. Avram and Lot separate. God promises Avram that his descendants will be "as numerous as the stars in the heavens," and establishes a covenant with him. Sarai is unable to bear children: however. Avram and Hagar. Sarai's handmaid, give birth to Ishmael. God changes the names of Avram and Sarai to Avraham and Sarah. As the portion closes. Avraham circumcises himself. Ishmael and all the males of his household in compliance with God's words.

Today's Haftarah

The Prophet Isaiah consoles the people of Israel, exiled in Babylonia. The exile has been long and bitter, and the people need reassurance that God has neither forgotten them, nor is too weak to redeem them. If the redemption is coming about more slowly than they had expected, says Isaiah, it is because God has a reason for delaying it. We, as humans, cannot expect to understand all of God's ways. In the second part of the Haftarah, God tells the children of Israel that He is behind the rise of the Persian king Cyrus and that He will use Cyrus as an instrument to bring about the people's return to the land of Israel. The connection of this Haftarah to the Torah portion is found in 41:8 of the Haftarah: "But you, Israel, My servant, Jacob whom I have chosen, the seed of Abraham, My friend." This verse harkens back to the covenant initiated in this week's Torah reading.
