GENERAL INFORMATION

CHILD'S RESPONSIBLITIES

- 1. **Practice** We expect your child to practice 30 minutes per day to ensure that they will be fully prepared for their B'nai Mitzvah.
- 2. **Tikkun Olam Project** This is an opportunity for each child to individualize the experience of B'nai Mitzvah by pursuing a project that reaches into the community. The idea is for each student to find a cause they believe in and work to find a way through Social Action, Advocacy, Tzedaka, and Personal Commitment to support it. A meeting should be scheduled with Rabbi Chapman, Cantor Stoehr or Rabbi Honig to explore the possibilities available in fulfilling this required element of the B'nai Mitzvah process.
- 3. Service Attendance Beginning in the 6th grade year, your child is expected to attend Shabbat/Holiday services 1-2 times per month to become familiar with the services. Ideally, you will attend with your child. 6th Grade Religious School/Mechina and 7th Grade Religious will meet mostly on Saturday mornings. (With regular attendance, this responsibility will be fulfilled). This is consistent with existing Religious School requirements.

PARENT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

Congregational Fees - All outstanding congregational fees (e.g. dues, tuition, B'nai Mitzvah fee) and assessments must be paid in full *30 days* prior to the date of the B'nai Mitzvah service. More detailed information on fees is available in this book.

Ambassador Program - Each B'nai Mitzvah family will be scheduled for Saturday morning service assignments via email. One parent (or both parents) and the B'nai Mitzvah child will serve as Shabbat Ambassadors assisting the congregation in creating a welcoming and helpful environment. The Ambassadors help the B'nai Mitzvah families by welcoming guests and congregants into our sanctuary. At 9:00 am sharp, a member of the Ritual Committee will meet with you to review specific details of that morning's responsibility.

- 1. **Serving** Each B'nai Mitzvah family will be scheduled to serve at Kiddushim for other B'nai Mitzvah families. One parent (or both parents) and the B'nai Mitzvah child may participate in this responsibility. Assignments will be provided. Just as you will do for others, a group of B'nai Mitzvah parents and Sisterhood members will be there for you at your *simcha*. This allows you not only to reciprocate the generosity of those who will serve the day of your child's B'nai Mitzvah, but also gives you the opportunity to see, firsthand, what is involved in the Kiddush preparation and what your options are before finalizing Kiddush choices. Assignments for the Ambassador Program and Serving will be scheduled on different dates.
- 2. **Kiddush Sponsorship -** Providing a Kiddush luncheon for the congregation and your invited guests (following the Saturday Morning Service) is an obligation of the B'nai Mitzvah family. For more information on the Kiddush obligation, **please see page 19.**
- 3. **Kippot and/or head coverings** If a family is supplying their own kippot and/or head coverings, special baskets will be provided. These kippot need to be dropped off at the synagogue prior to 12:00 pm on the Friday before your *simcha*.
- 4. Please schedule your photographer and videographer appointments with Maria Catezone, Office Manager at Congregation Beth Shalom, 847-498-4100, x126.

TORAH READERS and YAD SQUAD

Your child will be reading from the Torah during the service. Please be aware that there is also an opportunity for other family members to read from the Torah as well. If either parent, a post B'nai Mitzvah sibling(s), cousin(s), grandparent(s) or family friends are interested in a Torah portion, please let Randi Simon know rsimon@bethshalomnb.org as soon as possible and she will be happy to assign a portion to you and help you, to the extent necessary, to prepare your reading.

You should also expect to see members of the Congregation Beth Shalom Yad Squad reading the Torah. This is a group of lay Torah readers over the age of B'nai Mitzvah who have taken on the mitzvah of reading Torah on a regular basis. There are teens and adults in this group and any one or more of them are likely to be participating in this way.

The Yad Squad is an exciting program at CBS, and we hope your child will be a part of it by coming back to read Torah!

Scholarship opportunities and incentives are available for participants!

Day of B'NAI MITZVAH SHABBAT MORNING

- 1. <u>SATURDAY MORNING SERVICES:</u> Services begin promptly at 9:30 AM. Every member of your immediate family should be present thirty (30) minutes prior to the start of services.
- 2. <u>AMBASSADORS:</u> A Ritual Committee member will direct the ushering procedures.
- 3. <u>ALIYOT AND HONORS:</u> For a B'nai Mitzvah, the family may receive up to three Aliyot (in addition to the B'nai Mitzvah child) and for an Ark opening (up to four people). All honorees must be Jewish and of B'nai Mitzvah age.

Please note the following:

An Aliyah means coming to the Torah to recite the appropriate blessings before and after the Torah reading.

The Torah Blessings can be found on page 11 of this booklet. Please distribute a copy of the blessings to those having an Aliyah several weeks prior to the date of the B'nai Mitzvah. Any honoree having an Aliyah **must** be able to recite the blessings correctly. Audio recordings are available upon request and are available on the CBS website.

It is important that all honorees be present at the start of the service (9:30 AM).

Non-Jewish family members may participate by reciting the Prayer for Peace in English.

- 4. <u>PROCEDURE</u>: All matters pertaining to the order of the service, family participation on the bimah, and the service itself will be explained at various meetings with the Rabbis, Cantor, and B'nai Mitzvah Tutors prior to the service.
- 5. <u>KIDDUSH:</u> Please refer to the Kiddush Information page located on page 19 of this book.
- 6. <u>LIVE STREAMING</u>: All Shabbat services are available for viewing on the Beth Shalom website. You can provide the link to the Live Stream page to your friends and family who are not able to join you for in-person worship.

*NOTE: We do not have onsite technical staff on Shabbat; technical difficulties cannot be addressed during a Shabbat service.

Shabbat services are available to view for 1 week following the B'nai Mitzvah – choose "previous broadcasts" when clicking on the Kamensky Sanctuary from our Live Stream page on our website.

Praise to You, O Lord, for keeping us alive, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this day.
Bless, O God; watch over him/her/them, protect him/her/them and guide him/her/them. Help him/her/them to continue to grow in body and mind, in soul and character. Keep him/her/them loyal to our people and to the teachings of our Torah. May his/her/their life be rich and rewarding. May all his/her/their deeds bring pride to us, honor to the House of Israel, and glory to Your name. Amen.

BLESSINGS BEFORE AND AFTER THE TORAH READING

Before the Reading

When you are called to the Bimah, stand before the Torah, take the corner of the tallit (for women, if you are not wearing a tallit, take the Torah sash). The reader will show you where to touch the Torah with the tallit or sash. Next, bring the tallit or sash to your lips and kiss it. Then recite the following:

Bar'chu et Adonai ham'vorach

The congregation will recite the following single line. You repeat the line after the congregation recites it. You then immediately continue with the next paragraph.

Baruch Adonai ham'vorach l'olam va-ed

Baruch atah Adonai, Elohaynu melech hah-olam, asher ba-cahr bahnu mekol haamim v'natan lanu et torahto. Baruch atah Adonai notayn ha-Torah.

After the Reading

After the reading, the reader will, once again, show you where to touch the Torah with the Tallit or sash. Again, bring the tallit or sash to your lips and kiss it, then recite the following:

Baruch atah Adonai, Elohaynu melech ha-olam asher natan lanu torat emet v'chayey olam nata b'tochaynu. Baruch atah Adonai, notayn ha-Torah.

After your honor, please move to the other side of the bimah so you can be witness for the next honoree.

Continuing Education Beyond B'nai and 7th Grade

Next-step learning for our young adults as they continue their Jewish journeys – we strongly believe that Jewish education does not END with a B'nai Mitzvah – it is a new beginning!

The **goals of the program** are:

- 1. To help our students continue their Jewish education in a comfortable and secure atmosphere.
- 2. To look at topics through a Jewish lens.
- 3. To prepare teens for life challenges.
- 4. To continue building community with peers.

Our 7th Grade Program/Kitah Zayin is a bridge between Religious School and CBS High. Since students' simchas are at different parts of the year, we do not focus on BM preparation. On Saturdays, our students meet in the lobby and enter the Kamensky Sanctuary together and sit as a class. They are in the service during the Torah Service (the part they should be familiar with for their special day) and then have the option to stay in the service or go into a classroom with the teacher for a snack and to discuss and have activities on the Torah portion of the week. On Tuesdays, students begin with dinner and learning/practicing *Birkat HaMazon*. They have a conversational Hebrew class that also keeps their reading skills sharp. Their second class is IsraelLink, a technology-based program rooted in inquiry, identity and connection. Through interactive lessons, primary sources, and multimedia content, students explore the people, land, and story of Israel with depth and nuance. At the end of class, students participate in minyan here at CBS and have the opportunity to lead as well.

CBS High/8th-12th Grade - Class meets Sundays, twice a month from 12:15 to 2:15 P.M.

- Dynamic teachers, small groups and access to the best resources.
- 8th graders have an opportunity to participate in Israel Now peer group trip to Israel. There are scholarships available for CBS members.
- Option for high school students to receive <u>college credit</u>
- Good resume-builder for college applications.
- Facetime and meaningful discussions with clergy.
- Topics that are of particular interest to our students. Past topics include Israel, antisemitism, climate change, Jews in sports, Holocaust studies, and Jews in media.
- Lunch is provided for all students.

B'nai Mitzvah Gift of Israel

Dear Family:

Mazel Tov to you on your child's upcoming B'nai Mitzvah. As this important spiritual step on the ladder of your child's Jewish education draws near, we would like to invite you to participate in the B'nai Mitzvah Gift of Israel Program established by the Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago. The Gift of Israel provides an opportunity for celebrants to save toward an Israel Experience trip that will enhance their sense of Jewish identity for the rest of their lives and is an integral part of your child's Jewish education.

The B'nai Mitzvah Gift of Israel Program is open to all B'nai Mitzvah age youths throughout the Chicago area. Your child is eligible for enrollment starting 6 months prior to their B'nai Mitzvah date. Funds may be deposited into the Gift of Israel account anytime between enrollment in the program and the time that your child goes to Israel. All funds, plus interest earned, may be used toward any approved Israel Experience Program anytime from the summer following ninth grade through the participant's twenty-third birthday. Unused funds and all accrued interest are fully refundable to the family at any time. As an added bonus, once \$1000 has been deposited into your child's account, Federation will add a onetime matching gift of \$180 to be allocated at the time of your child's Israel Experience.

SYNAGOGUE INITIATIVES

The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum "Remember Us" Project

The darkest chapter of the 20th Century, the Holocaust, is being remembered through the establishment of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC. One important focus of the Museum is the education of the half million school children who visit the Museum each year from all over the United States.

The "Remember Us" Project was established so that B'nai Mitzvah children can remember one of the 1.5 million Jewish children who were murdered by the Nazis before being able to fulfill the Mitzvah of learning Torah. The B'nai Mitzvah dedicates the occasion to the memory of this child symbolizing the importance of remembering the past as well as educating for the future.

By participating in the "Remember Us" Project, a family will have the opportunity to remember a child who was not able to celebrate his or her own B'nai Mitzvah and be part of the historic efforts of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum.

How Can You Participate?

If there is a relative or friend of your family who is a survivor of the Holocaust, the B'nai Mitzvah child is encouraged to speak directly to that person, who will give them a name and the background on a child that they knew, who did not survive the Holocaust. If this is not the case, the Midwest Regional Office of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum will provide the B'nai Mitzvah with the name, birthdate, picture (if available) and other biographical information on the child who is to be remembered.

The B'nai Mitzvah will receive a certificate from the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum recognizing the importance of remembrance and of this Mitzvah.

The B'nai Mitzvah family is encouraged to honor the memory of this child who perished by making a meaningful contribution to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. Your support is very much appreciated.

B'nai Mitzvah Commitment Fee - \$1950 billed over 3 years (\$650 per year): must be paid in full 60 days prior to your B'nai Mitzvah date.

This fee includes:

Mechina (*preparation*) Class- 6th grade students will attend sessions that will be scheduled Shabbat / Sunday Mornings, alternating throughout the year. On Shabbat, students will meet with B'nai Mitzvah coordinator, Randi Simon, and learn some of the prayers associated with the Shabbat morning service as well as trope for chanting Torah and spend part of the session in the sanctuary. It is our hope that the students will become more familiar with the flow of the service and see firsthand how students are participating in services at their B'nai Mitzvah. During this year students and parents have the opportunity to lead the Torah Service and other prayers for a special Mechina Shabbat. During selected Sunday sessions parents will convene with the Clergy to discuss pertinent religious and social issues while students learn Trope and prayer Skills with Randi and together, parents and students will experience unique interactive programming.

Tutoring –Tutoring begins approximately one year before the B'nai Mitzvah, and it includes individualized tutoring once a week until the date of their *Simcha*. Each child will have approximately 42 lessons, each of which is 20-30 minutes in length. <u>Students are expected to practice regularly at home</u>. (20-30 minutes a day, 5-6X a week is suggested).

Day of B'nai Mitzvah – Set up/cleanup of the social hall, kitchen staff, bimah flowers and all paper goods and basic table coverings.

Clergy Meetings - As a member of CBS, you always have access to our Clergy and Staff. As part of your CBS B'nai Mitzvah preparation, special meetings will be set up with Rabbi Chapman, Cantor Stoehr and/or Rabbi Honig.

- The Clergy meets with the student and parents to help narrow down and focus on the necessary steps for achieving a successful Tikkun Olam project
- The Clergy will meet with student and parents about two months prior to study and prepare ideas for your child's D'var Torah as well as discuss family honors and other service logistics.
- A member of our Clergy will meet you on the bimah within 2 weeks of the *Simcha* for a final walk-through.

It is vital that you and your child keep track of meeting dates and deadlines. It is very difficult to reschedule appointments in the weeks leading up to the B'nai Mitzvah date.
The clergy and staff, as always, will be available to answer any of your questions and concerns at any time.

Kiddush Information

As your child's B'nai Mitzvah approaches, I would like to share some important information regarding the Kiddush luncheon on that special day. CBS manages all aspects of the Kiddush. We are here to work with you.

CBS encourages the spirit of community by hosting a Kiddush Luncheon after services each Shabbat. It is our policy that B'nai Mitzvah families help financially support the Kiddush Luncheon following the celebration of their child's B'nai Mitzvah. We ask that the signed **Kiddush Agreement** be submitted **four months** prior to your Simcha and **full Payment be made two weeks prior**. Please feel free to contact Executive Director Michael Garlin if you have any questions or concerns regarding your financial obligation.

You will be contacted three (3) weeks before your *Simcha* to get a final count of your guests. It is very important that you provide an accurate count. The amount of food ordered, and the number of tables used is dependent upon the numbers you provide. Clergy, staff and children five years or younger do not need to be included in your count.

A shortage of food and seating embarrasses everyone.

CBS would also like you to be aware of the following synagogue policies:

- The Kiddush is a community meal for which the entire Congregation is welcome to participate.
- One or two tables will be reserved for the immediate family of the B'nai Mitzvah.
- NOTHING CAN BE BROUGHT INTO OR REMOVED FROM THE SYNAGOGUE ON SHABBAT OR HOLIDAYS.
- Personalized napkins and fresh flowers can be ordered for the Kiddush by Randi Simon if not part of package.

In accordance with Kashrut and Sanitation Guidelines, CBS will provide all food unless an approved Caterer has been contracted (See Page 9)

- Other families who may be celebrating a *simcha* on your day may choose to add items to the Kiddush menu. If this should happen, that family is responsible for ALL costs associated with the addition, including paying for all of your guests.
- Please notify CBS of any bus transportation to a party or luncheon that may take place after services.
- * Please inform us of any known food allergies or dietary restrictions.

Again, Mazel Tov on reaching this exciting milestone!

Our Kosher kitchen is only able to accommodate <u>one</u> (1) of our caterers per weekend. After a caterer has been scheduled to be used for <u>any</u> reason on a particular weekend, only that caterer can be used for another event that same weekend. This also applies to using a caterer for your Kiddush or Oneg Shabbat. Since this process is implemented on a first-come, first-serve basis, it is important to contact Maria or Jill to schedule the use of a caterer or check on availability.

Drop off Friday Night Dinner:

Congregation Beth Shalom offers our congregants the opportunity for Friday Night Dropoff or Catered Dinners. Dropoff dinners are dinners that are arranged with a Kosher Restaurant or Caterer, which will drop off the food and our staff will set up a buffet, warm the food, and clean up.

Up to 40 guests: Base fee \$200 + \$100 Non-Refundable Security Fee

Up to 80 guests: Base fee \$375 + \$100 Non-Refundable Security Fee

Up to 120 guests: Base fee \$500 + \$100 Non-Refundable Security Fee

Base fee Includes round guest tables, folding chairs, white skirted rectangle buffet tables, white skirted drink table, salt and pepper, ice water, coffee, tea, sweeteners, creamer, *motzi* table, hand washing table and kitchen staff. This base fee does not change if congregant does not use all of the above.

Additional \$2.50 per guest will be charged if using Beth Shalom white plastic tablecloths for all tables, disposable paper goods and flatware.

Arrangements must be made for any other items brought in via email at least one month before the dinner to Maria Catezone, Office Manager, at mcatezone@bethshalomnb.org. These items include, but are not limited to:

If not received at the synagogue by Friday, we will provide white dinner plates, paper cups, white napkins, white plastic flatware, and white plastic tablecloths at an additional charge of \$2.50 per person.
