This Week's Parashah

On his way to Haran, Jacob dreams of angels as-
cending and descending a ladder. God appears to
Jacob and repeats the blessing given to Abraham
and Isaac, and promises to protect him and return
him to Canaan. When Jacob arrives in Haran, his
uncle Laban takes him in. Laban has two daugh-
ters, Leah and Rachel. Jacob agrees to work for
Laban seven years and then take Rachel as a wife.
Laban deceives Jacob on the wedding night and
substitutes Leah for Rachel. To appease Jacob's
anger over the deception, Laban agrees that Ra-
chel, too, can be Jacob's wife in exchange for an
additional seven years of labor. Leah bears Jacob
four sons: Reuben, Simeon, Levi and Judah. Ra-
chel is barren, so she gives Jacob her maid Bilhah
as a concubine. Bilhah bears two sons - Dan and
Naphtali. Leah, in turn, gives Jacob Zilpah, her
maid, as a concubine and Zilpah bears two sons,
Gad and Asher. Leah then has three more chil-
dren: Issachar, Zebulun, and Dinah. Finally, Rachel
conceives and bears Joseph. Jacob wishes to re-
turn to Canaan, but Laban is reluctant to let him
go. They agree that as his wages for 20 years of
service, Jacob can take some of Laban's flock.
Then, without alerting Laban, Jacob and his fami-
ly flee Haran. As they leave, Rachel steals her fa-
ther's idols. Laban pursues Jacob, but God warns
him not to take revenge.

Today's Haftarah

The people of Israel were worshiping
idols and were being influenced by other
nations. Assyria was becoming very
powerful and posed a threat. The proph-
et Hosea tells the people about their an-
cestor, Jacob. Although Jacob led a hard
life, he loved God and looked to God to
guide him. Hosea explains that the peo-
ple need God's guidance to survive, as
we have needed it throughout history.
Even when Israel errs God retains God's
love for the people. The spirit of teshu-
vah (repentance) is found throughout
the selection. "Jacob fled into the field of
Aram, and Israel searched for a wife."
This opening verse of the Haftarah brings
us back to the beginnings of the people
Israel, Jacob's people. This week's Torah
portion revolves around Jacobs story: his
flight from home and the beginnings of
not only the next generation but founda-
tion of what will be the B'nai Yisrael, lit-
erally, Jacob's (whose name is later
changed to Yisrael) children.
